A Litany For Creation

- One: We recognize with deep concern the crisis of our planet. We now confess O God, that we have taken our job as caretakers of the garden less than seriously.
- All: Have mercy on us O God.
- One: For our inaction in caring for the air, waters, land, people, animals, and insects, we seek Your forgiveness. O Lord, hear our prayer.
- All: We confess we have not valued Your garden, the air which sustains breath; the water, the drink of life; nor the land with its soil that provides food for all living creatures.
- One: We confess that we have turned Your diverse, interconnected Eden into manipulated growing fields of exploitation of land and water and people. We have dominated and enslaved our Black and Brown sisters and brothers for cheap crops and goods, which continues today.

- All: Free us O Lord, from the gods of greed, wealth and private property and the heresy of believing that what we own is ours to use or abuse and not Yours to respect, share, and give away for the benefit and blessing of all.
- One: Free us from the idols of comfort and ease, of speed and productivity that lead us to violate relationships and ignore the needs of the earth and each other.

All: Hear us, O God of Life, that we may have the strength of will and character to build community and the humility to learn to rely on one another, especially listening to our young, our poor, and those who have been most often silenced, we pray. May we become models of leadership in our own communities and mighty advocates for the generations that follow us, we pray. Amen.
